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The allotment called "The Firs" is situated N. & W. of the small allotment given by the Award to Fr. Bolton's land. The monks' cemetery was placed there in Prior Cock-shoot's time. (Abbot Prest assigns this to Prior Cooper A.J. vol. 7-p. 56). Fr. Bernard Ryding was the first priest to be buried in it in Sept. 1841.

Before that date Fathers Coupe, Clarkson & Riston had been buried in the garden enclosure, N.W. of the original chapel. The site is now occupied by the Boiler House & Chimney. Their bodies were transferred to the new cemetery & placed at the entrance on the north side at the east end. There is a stone, now rather weathered, over the grave.

The date of the translation is not recorded, but it seems probable that it was in 1839, followed by the burial of John Collins in 1940 & Fr. Bernard Ryding in 1941.

Edward Massey died on Oct. 27<sup>th</sup> 1854 & was presumably buried in the place allotted.
